The Sno-Foo award is presented each conference to an individual or group of individuals for having committed an outstanding "blooper" worthy of repeated telling. The recipient earns the award often unwittingly but always deservedly. To be considered for this award a member must be in good standing (but sometimes wavering) of the Eastern Snow Conference. SNO FOO 1999—Ross Brown

The Sno-Foo award for 1999 is given to our dear friend and President, Ross Brown. Dr. Brown is a snow scientist with the Canadian government and lives in the snowy and sometimes icy city of Montreal. He is famous and highly regarded throughout the world for his study of continental and global snow cover and its variation with climate and weather systems. As such, Ross keeps his eyes on the horizon and looks for the "big snowy picture."
